### **The Great Seal of Utah**

The state seal was adopted in its current form in 1896 when Utah gained statehood. The state seal features a beehive as its central element, symbolizing industry and cooperation. The beehive is a symbol of thrift and hard work, reflecting the values of the early Mormon pioneers who settled in the region. Surrounding the beehive, there are various symbols representing aspects of Utah's history, economy, and natural resources.

### These symbols include:

- Shield with a Bevy of Arrows: Symbolizing defense.
- U.S. Flags: Representing Utah's support for the United States.

The word "Industry" appears above the beehive, and is also Utah's motto. "Industry" reflects the state's commitment to hard work and productivity.




## **Utah State Capitol**

The first territorial capitol was built in Fillmore, Utah, in 1855. However, the seat of government was later moved to Salt Lake City.

The first Utah State Capitol building in Salt Lake City was constructed between 1856 and 1857 but was never completed due to financial difficulties and the Utah War.

In 1912, after years of planning and discussion, construction began on the current Utah State Capitol building, located in Salt Lake City. The construction was completed in 1916, and the building was dedicated on October 9, 1916. The inside of the Capitol features beautiful murals, sculptures, and stained glass windows, reflecting Utah's history, culture, and natural beauty.

The Utah State Capitol continues to serve as the seat of government for the state of Utah. It stands as a symbol of Utah's history, growth, and commitment to democratic governance.
